During the reception following the graduation ceremony, Salutatorian Alyssa Bogosian reflected on her time as a student. "The first few years focused on learning the basis of our faith; learning about who Jesus was, what the Bible was all about. As we learned about the basis of our faith and the church, we learned about how our traditions came to be, and what our church means. We learned about our Armenian roots, about our tumultuous history, and about how our beautiful culture continues to be reflected in the church services we take part in each week. As we entered high school and began facing the challenges of the real world, we learned about how our faith can guide us in all aspects of life."

Emma Kaloostian, this year's Valedictorian, spoke on the importance of participating in service during her last year of Sunday School. "I can honestly say that I don't think any of us have experienced life more than we have this year. All of us are taking so many lessons from this year, ranging from not judging a book by its cover to simply holding the door open for someone and how it could just maybe make their day. Going on these service trips have made us better people, more mature people, people with perception, people with empathy. This past year has changed my outlook; I want to be a better person, for myself, for society, in the eyes of our church. I hope we all never forget that we are capable of making a difference."

Julie, this year's eleventh grade teacher, left the students and their families with an important message. "Don't let our world be a world where we ignore things that matter. Make sure that as you all head out into the real world you speak up about things that matter. Remember that you can make a difference, and that you already have. And remember, when the world gets overwhelming, you can always return home to Saint James."

MY EXPERIENCE IN THE HOLY LAND

In early June, a group of young adults from parishes across the Eastern Diocese came together to journey halfway across the world, to a place they had only heard about. Ten days later, the 29 young pilgrims returned as a family, changed by their experiences and brought together by their spiritual journey in the footsteps of our Lord Jesus Christ.

The fourth annual Youth Leadership Pilgrimage to the Holy Land was led by Archbishop Khajag Barsamian, Primate of the Diocese of the Armenian Church of America (Eastern). The Primate was assisted by the Rev. Fr. Hovsep Karapetyan, pastor of St. Mary Church of Washington, DC, Maria Derderian, our youth minister; and Arpi Nakashian, a student at St. Nersess Armenian Seminary.

What follows is a reflection from ACYOA Seniors Co-Chair Karina Bekelian, this year's representative from St. James. fter I received the news that I would be traveling to Jerusalem with other young leaders of the Armenian Church, there were no words to describe the mix of emotions I felt. I was so excited to finally be able to experience the Holy Land. Our group instantly clicked at the airport when we all met for the first time, and it wasn't until the trip had

been well under way that I realized the effect of the group on my trip as a whole.

During the entire plane ride, and until the morning after we landed, I was more anxious than ever. I truly didn't know what to expect, and it was a huge culture shock to walk around Jerusalem and seeing people from every religion live so close to one another, with such a clear divide among their cultures. It wasn't until we began our pilgrimage in Bethlehem and participated in the Divine Liturgy where Jesus was born that I began to feel at home. After that, I felt immediately connected to the state that we would continue to explore. Badarak in Bethlehem was special for so many reasons. We walked up the hill to the entrance plaza to find the Armenian flag waving proudly atop the Church of Nativity, next to the symbol of the Armenian Patriarchate. We soon learned that the Armenians have the right to celebrate Divine Liturgy daily at the birthplace of Christ, and other holy sites. I did not expect to see Armenian priests holding back other tourists from entering the grotto while we were celebrating Badarak. Just as Jesus' life began in Bethlehem, it was also the beginning of the pilgrimage and my faith only grew stronger as we continued our journey.

I could feel the presence of the Holy Spirit as we traveled to the various holy sites, especially at the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, the site of Christ's tomb. We celebrated Divine Liturgy there at 3 a.m. and after it concluded, we were able to see the tomb of Jesus. Immediately after I set my hand upon the tomb, I felt chills. It is difficult to describe such a life-changing experience, but it is safe to say I have never felt anything of this nature in my life before. One thing most of us take for granted at our home parishes is our choir, sharing their talent and leading us in all the sharagans. Each time we had Divine Liturgy, it was up to us to provide the vocals and bring the service together, from the deacons to the choir to the celebrant. Participating in it this way helped me stay connected to the service and learn more of what takes place throughout the Liturgy.

Along with visiting these holy sites, we also had influential Bible studies that correlated with the sites we were visiting. One was at the Jordan River and we discussed the concept of baptism, how it related to Jesus' life back then, and how it related to us now. These Bible studies brought everything we experienced into perspective, as we walked in the footsteps of Jerus. Discussing the Bible with my peers that were on this special journey with me helped strengthen my faith in a way I never would have thought was possible. They helped bring various things to light that I had interpreted differently prior to the trip. My pilgrimage to Jerusalem was special in so many ways and it doesn't do justice by writing about it for everyone to read – it really is something each individual should experience at least once in their lifetime. We learn about Jesus' life in Sunday school and see the drawn pictures, but to see these places in real life is an eye opening experience. I'm now able to associate a place and feeling with what I've grown up learning. Not only did I grow spiritually, but I was also lucky to experience the Armenian culture in Jerusalem. The Armenian community was extremely welcoming and the Sts. James cathedral was the most beautiful church I have ever visited. I am extremely grateful for the amazing opportunity to travel to Jerusalem and I hope to go back as soon as possible.

WOMEN'S GUILD NEWS

From May 1st-4th, Gail Boroyan, Nancy Kassabian, Janice Kavjian and Aracse Kurkjian took part in the 28th Annual Women's Guild Assembly in New York City, presided over by His Eminence Khajag Barsamian. Held in conjunction with the Diocesan Assembly, clergy and Women's Guild delegates participated in an interactive session, where they brainstormed how parishes can encourage more women to be active in the Women's Guild, and how they can carry out the Diocesan theme of "Living the Gospel of Christ." Nancy Kassabian, St. James Women's Guild Chair, was elected Chair of the Women's Guild Central Council for 2014-2015.

A PERPETUAL MEMORIAL for remembrance of our loved ones

The St. James Perpetual Memorial is located in the foyer of the Church on both sides of the entrance to the sanctuary. The archway and modules of the Memorial Plaques were installed in 1991. The archway depicts symbols of the Armenian Church, with the name of our church, St. James Armenian Apostolic Church, at the top of the door. Three sets of wooden modules that hold the Memorial Plaques are on either side of the door. They are made of red oak and enhance and complement the interior of the church sanctuary.

Each Memorial Plaque is 2" x 10" in size. Each plaque bears the name of the departed loved one being memorialized in both Armenian and English, and also bears an inscription of years of birth and passing. Plaques are installed on the Perpetual Memorial at the requested area. Only one person may be remembered on each plaque.

The contribution for each Memorial Plague is \$1,000. The majority of this donation is placed in the St. James Permanent Fund, where it will generate continuing income for our parish. Families or individuals wanting to reserve Memorial Plaques in advance may do so, and may also select the area of the Perpetual Memorial on which their plaque(s) will be placed, by making full payment in advance.

PASTORAL CARE: HOME AND HOSPITAL CLERGY VISITS

The clergy are always available and would like to visit homebound and hospitalized parishioners. If you or someone you know is ill or hospitalized and would like to be visited, please call the church office at (617) 923-8860. Please note: when asked about your religion at a hospital, patients should list themselves as "Armenian Orthodox" or "Armenian" not "other."

REQUIEM SERVICE/HOKEHANKISD

Arrangements for Requiem Service, Altar Flowers and Candles should be made through the church office by Thursday at noon. In accordance with the canons of the Armenian Church, Requiem Services may not be performed on the five major feast days: Armenian Christmas, Easter, The Feast of the Transfiguration, The Feast of the Assumption of the Mother of God, and The Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross.

BAPTISMS AND CHRISMATIONS

All baptisms must be scheduled at least two months in advance by calling the church office. According to the Armenian Church canons, a Baptism may only be performed once in a person's lifetime, provided such Baptism has been performed in a Christian Church and in the name of the Holy Trinity.

At least one of the godparents must be a member of the Armenian Apostolic Orthodox Church.

WEDDINGS

Parishioners should contact the church office at least eight months in advance. A couple must contact St. James to confirm the availability of the Pastor and sanctuary prior to making any other arrangements.

All weddings must follow the Canons of the Armenian Apostolic Orthodox Church and the laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. In accordance with Diocesan discipline mandated by the Primate, all Sacraments must be performed in the church sanctuary.

The couple must meet with the Pastor at least once for pre-marital preparation and counseling. Weddings cannot be performed during Great Lent or Holy Week, or on the five major feast days: Armenian Christmas, Holy Easter, The Feast of the Transfiguration, The Feast of the Assumption of the Mother of God, and The Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross.

FUNERALS

Families should make arrangements with the funeral director of their choice, who will contact the church office to arrange the funeral service. Generally, St. James coordinates funerals with Bedrosian Funeral Home and Giragosian Funeral Home; both are located in Watertown and are familiar with our Church traditions.

Funerals may not be performed on religious holidays, major feast days, Saturdays after 3:00 p.m., or on Sundays.
